

Palm Sunday-The Passion of the Lord April 14th, 2019

Marriages: This great sacrament of vocation is a joyous time, but also a time of very serious spiritual preparation. The responsibility assumed by the couple and the Church is significant. While many focus on the day of the wedding, we seek to prepare for the second day and beyond. The Bishops of NJ have adopted a policy to assist in this preparation. Attendance at Engaged Encounter, Pre-Cana, or another approved marriage prep program, and individual sessions with a priest or deacon are required of all couples. Couples should contact the Rectory one year in advance of the intended marriage, and before finalizing other detail particularly reception facilities.

Baptisms: The Church shares the joy of families in the birth of children, and, with their parents takes seriously the responsibility of bringing them up in the faith. Parents seeking baptism for their children are to attend Baptismal Prep Class. This can be arranged by calling the parish office. Parents should be registered members of the parish. Godparents, those who represent the church in the life of the child, must be practicing Catholics, if they are married, they must have been married in the Church, practice the faith regularly, and must obtain a sponsor certificate from their home parish. Please choose Godparents with these criteria in mind.

Anointing of the Sick: This sacrament is given for those facing serious illness or surgery, and for those of advanced years. If you or a family member is planning to enter the hospital, please see one of the priests following Mass or call the rectory if you would like to receive this sacrament.

From Father Doug:

Today we begin the most important days of the year in the Church's life. The central event in all of history is remembered and relived through words, ancient liturgical celebrations, music and the drama of the story of all stories. Today with symbolic branches of palm we greet our Savior and King, but moments later we hear how the crowd turned on him in just a few days with their shouts changing from "Hosanna" to "Crucify." We mark this week the solemn events that were the path to the resurrection, but we cannot rush there, for to deny the agony is to forget the cost of the gift that was given to us, the gift of new life.

On Monday we remember the tender act of kindness to our Lord as he was anointed at the house of Lazarus in Bethany, a small gesture of love that prepared him for week that lay ahead. On Tuesday we gear the first words of the Last Supper, the prediction of Peter's denial, and the innocent question "Lord, where are you going?" He was going to the cross, yet the disciples still did not understand. On Wednesday reminds us of Judas Iscariot's treachery and greed that surrendered the Lord of Life into the hands of evil men. Thursday we here of the institution of the Mass, the sacrament of Christ's love, and we watch with Jesus until midnight at the Altar of Repose, remembering our Lord's agony in the garden. Good Friday's liturgy at 3 p.m. is one of the most important of the year. It invites us to pray for the needs of the whole world, to receive our Lord's Body in communion, to venerate the Cross, the symbol of death that brought life, and to acknowledge our sinfulness, our part in the weight of sin he bore on his shoulders as he hung from the cross. The Great Vigil of Easter rehearses for us our salvation story from the beginning and we greet the first news of Resurrection. Easter Sunday, yes the crowds will be here, and well they should. We hope that something will touch them deep in their hearts and reconnect them to the gift of new life brought by the Lord.

Yes, it is a busy week, but a very important week. Holy Week brings us closer to the Lord, remembering clearly all he did for us in those dreadful days so long ago, his death that brings us life. Please join us as we walk with the Lord during these sacred days. In order to truly greet the joy of Easter we must see the sacrifice he made and considering in our own hearts that with all he did for us, what are we willing to do for Christ today?

O Jesus, Who by reason of thy burning love for us hast willed to be crucified and to shed Thy Most Precious Blood for the redemption and salvation of our souls, look down upon us here gathered together in remembrance of Thy most sorrowful Passion and Death, fully trusting in Thy mercy; cleanse us from sin by Thy grace, sanctify our toil, give unto us and unto all those who are dear to us our daily bread, sweeten our sufferings, bless our families, and to the nations so sorely afflicted, grant Thy peace, which is the only true peace, so that by obeying Thy commandments we may come at last to the glory of heaven. Amen.

THE STORY OF OUR REDEMPTION

We begin the final week of Lent with these familiar readings. This year, we hear the Passion from the Gospel of Luke. These readings for Palm Sunday and the Passion used to be read on successive Sundays. Now they are combined into a single feast, so that we may see the whole sweep of the glory and the suffering played out. Jesus accepts the adulation of the crowd, the foreshadowing of his glory in the Resurrection. He bids farewell to his disciples in his last Passover, and forgives his tormentors as he dies on the cross. Later this week, we enter the Holy Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, when the whole story of our redemption will play out once again.



TODAY'S READINGS

Gospel at the Procession with Palms — Jesus' entry into Jerusalem (Luke 19:28-40).

First Reading — In spite of my sufferings I am not disgraced. I am not put to shame (Isaiah 50:4-7).

Psalm — My God, my God, why have you abandoned me? (Psalm 22).

Second Reading — Christ emptied himself, and God filled this emptiness with exaltation (Philippians 2:6-11).

Gospel — The account of Christ's passion according to Luke (Luke 22:14 — 23:56 [23:1-49]).
